Greetings Ross Sheppard High School community,

Since the first newsletter, we successfully accomplished many tasks lending to the amazing spirit at Ross Sheppard High School.

December had a focus on celebratory events that took us right into the holiday season. We ended the final day of classes with our annual Muffins and Music, capped off by a talent show for the ages. Many extracurricular events in December set the tone for an amazing accomplishment of volunteerism at Shep. Students and staff had a well-deserved break, followed by a return to academics in January.

January got us back into the thick of it, as we experienced some frigid cold temperatures and jumped into diplomas, with students writing English and Social Studies Part A exams during week two. By January 22nd, we were into full assessment/exam mode. This process was remarkably successful and a huge congrats goes out to staff for their hard work and dedication preparing Shep students for their succession plans. Extending another shout-out to the students, who really immersed themselves into coursework to finish off a fabulous first semester.

February kicked off the second semester and we did it in fashion, with the launch of our Black History Month celebrations. School started well, as students were focused on getting closer to attaining their high school diploma. You could see the dedication and commitment in the building. As a Principal, I was thrilled by the positive student conduct and work happening in and out of the classroom at Ross Sheppard High School. We began the second semester with 2310 students, the highest population seen in many years, and launched into our pre-enrolment phase, registering students for the 2024-2025 school year. For the first time in the history of the school we are an official Growth Level Two school, meaning that Shep is closed to students outside of our catchment area, unless they qualify. To focus on any one particular aspect of our school would be unfair to the many that are doing amazing things. As a Principal in my fourth year at Ross Sheppard High School, I couldn't be more proud of the accomplishments that have been achieved to date. I have personally witnessed some amazing growth at Shep, with engagement at an alltime high. Our staff are working extremely hard to support students and I am able to visualize many successionoriented students possessing growth mindsets, due in part to our Career Pathways programming.

I want to thank our School Council and families for some very engaging monthly meetings, with growth in the number of parents attending. These meetings provide parents with a chance to discuss how they view high school through their child's lens. Our meetings help bring conversations to the table that may never otherwise surface due to challenges around connecting in-person. Without any doubt, for me, one of the most important aspects of leadership is connection with parents. I continue to be cliché with this statement, but please know that my door is always open. I have learned that much about the success of students in school comes from a intact, triangulated relationship between parents, children and school.

The true spirit of WE ARE SHEP lives in our halls and is certainly practiced by all. The foundational principles that our school lives by include the ability to show LeaderShep and MentorShep, build RelationSheps, and strive to achieve ScholarSheps. MATHEMATICS

For the Mathematics department, this time of year is about looking forward to the upcoming season of math contests. We start to seek out interested and skilled students who might want to try their hand at contests individually, or perhaps join our big team math competition that will be happening April 11th.

This year, our team competition is promising to be very exciting. The first indicator was that the University of Waterloo began planning on sending an individual to speak to us without us approaching them first. Our event is already on their radar as one to participate in. In fact, the representative of the Centre for Education in Mathematics and Computing (CEMC) is planning on coming out earlier to present at local schools during the days leading up to the competition.

The second indicator of excitement is the fact that we have had many other schools demonstrate a desire and plan to come and attend. It will be the first year that this competition becomes a provincial event. We have had schools from Sherwood Park, Camrose, Hinton, Red Deer, Medicine Hat and Calgary express an interest in participating. It's just so exciting! What a tremendous opportunity for students who are interested in mathematics to get a sense of the larger community they are a part of. At one point during the competition, guaranteed, we will have students recite the first few digits of pi, and when everyone starts reciting this together, they realize that they are not the only ones who cared to memorize them.

With this sort of growth, we are excited to look for ways to reward our winners in a more significant way. Hands down, the biggest reward that students get from our competition is bragging rights, but this year we are hoping to get some help so we can provide our winners with a bit more. There will be efforts made to connect with the local community to see what they might be willing to offer to support our competitors.

It is all very exciting! I hope to share news with you all of a Ross Sheppard victory on April 11th, but win or lose, we are going to have an amazing day!

SOCIAL STUDIES

This term has already been a busy one in Social Studies, as we start new courses and dive into current events and the curriculum. Our full-year IB classes finished the first semester with two exciting experiential learning activities. The 30 IB class participated in a socratic seminar that had them debating the different facets of authoritarianism in Nazi Germany. The Social 20 IB classes completed their Napoleon unit and put "Napoleon on Trial", debating in a court simulation as to whether Napoleon upheld the ideals of the French Revolution and nationalism in Europe. Students role-played the various leaders, citizens and lawyers, and of course Napoleon! With fabulous costumes, acting and use of historical knowledge in both classes, the result was the exile of Napoleon!



Coming up, our High School Model United Nations club will be participating in the University of Alberta MUN at the end of February and our Reach For the Top club will have their first competition in March.

FASHION STUDIES

The Fashion 10 classes finished the semester strong with a very fun project in the Redesign, Reuse and Recycle unit. We worked on simple, and more complicated repairs, all on a single pair of blue jeans. While many students worked on a donated pair of jeans, several chose jeans of their own and designed for themselves or family members. Some lovely work was done! We finished the semester with accessories - making hair scrunchies, keychain lip balm holders and bucket hats.



FOOD STUDIES

Foods 10

Another semester, and even more creative cooking! Foods 10 ends each term with a project to create a meal with limited time and carefully selected groceries. Highlights included Vietnamese spring rolls, Greek-style kabobs, tacos and lots of pasta. We introduced something new this year, encouraging students to come up with their own recipes for Potato Day and the Ramen Challenge. Students researched and developed recipes, including ones for gnocchi and stuffed potato pancakes. Our new classes of Foods 10 started in February with Foods Basics, learning how to work in our kitchens, master measurements and safely handle the larger chefs knives.



Foods K&E

The Foods 20/30 K&E class had an exciting semester. Foods 20 students continued to develop their confidence in the kitchen and were challenged with more complex recipes. While the task of a larger ingredient list seemed daunting, they were able to trust in their skills and cooked some fantastic dishes. Foods 30 students were given a cake challenge. They needed to plan a cake design, create an ingredient list to be purchased and decorate their cake. As the first group of Foods 30s to do this challenge, they set the bar high for the next group to follow!

Foods 20

Foods 20 classes are excited to start with the Milk, Eggs and Cheese unit. Some of the recipes include; meringues, lasagna, strawberry cheesecake, cream of potato soup, frittatas and custard pies. Yum!

Food Studies 30 is a time to be together in the kitchen. We began with the Food for the Life Stages module. Classes learned how to make baby food, kid snacks, teenage and senior meals, and develop special menus that included diabetes friendly, low-sodium, heart-healthy and high-fiber diets. The students were engaged and had fun in the classroom discussing the stages of our lives.





FINANCE

January was a whirlwind of excitement as Finance 10 students dove headfirst into the world of business simulations, showcasing their entrepreneurial prowess and strategic ability. The competition was fierce, the stakes were high, and the results? Nothing short of extraordinary!

Round Dance 101: The Round Dance ceremony illustrates the néhiyaw "" philosophy of death and its relationship between us and Spirits. The Northern Lights are said to be our relations who have passed on; Elders say the people that have passed on come to dance with us at the Round Dance; in that respect, our relatives are always here with us. In this dance, people move like the Northern Lights, in an up and down motion as they dance around the drum. We join hands in a circle and dance clockwise with the drum and singers sitting in the middle.

The beat of the drum is like the heartbeat of the community - all members move as one. The Round Dance was a healing ceremony that became a social dance for Indigenous people and a dance held in the winter season. A Round Dance is for everyone, children, friends, families, youth and Elders. This is a time to swap stories, catch up on the latest news, break bannock and share some tea. And even better, to hear both the old and new songs sung. It's a time to honour traditions and memories of our ancestors dancing around their starry campfires, flickering against the dark blanket of the night sky.

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

CAREER PATHWAYS

It was a busy first semester, with over 150 students accessing Work Experience and RAP programs here at Ross Sheppard. The Career Pathways office is located in the Learning Commons and is the place to go to for students wanting to access credits while working outside school in a part-time or volunteer basis. The RAP program is geared towards students interested in pursuing a career in the trades. We work in conjunction with the non-profit organization *Careers* to place trade interested students, allowing them an early start on their career journey while still in high school.
