PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Greetings Ross Sheppard High School community. This year just seems to be moving at warp speed. I am in disbelief that we are already at the halfway point of the school year. I think it's fair to say that we can chalk this up to a memorable experience. Without question, it is clear that all of our community has learned so much from this experience. I am most appreciative and thankful for the support we have received. The Ross Sheppard community has such an incredible spirit to it.

COVID has hit some high schools hard since our return on January 11, 2021, however Ross Shep has not encountered the magnitude of cases that we experienced earlier this year. I do not feel it's anything special that we are doing, but I do feel that the lowering of cases in the province aligns with our data. We are looking forward to getting back to a regular model of school, but after this pandemic we know that we will have creative strategies in place to further our work. Thank you to the students for their great work in ensuring that protocols are followed, and working with the restrictions presented by the Division and school to ensure the safety for everyone. MATHEMATICS

This is stating the obvious, but a lot has changed this year! Many activities at school have had to be put on hold, but some have not. It turns out that writing math contests is one of those things that you not only can do socially distanced, we require it!

Although our numbers were down this year, we still had a group of students participate in the regular Math League Contests, as well as the Canadian Intermediate and Senior Math Competitions created by the Center for Education in Mathematics and Computing at the University of Waterloo. Our students performed very well on these larger contests. The marking has been a challenge for the CEMC, so we have not yet received the official results, but have been given a look at the preliminary results



and can be proud of how our students did. These are challenging contests that require a solid background in mathematics, and force students to think creatively about the mathematical tools they have and how to apply them. To gain some insight, shown below is a question from the Senior Exam.

Suppose that $f(x) = x^3 - px^2 + qx$ and $g(x) = 3x^2 - 2px + q$ for some positive integers p and q. Prove that there are infinitely many pairs of positive integers, (p,q), for which the following three statements are all true:

- The equation f(x) = 0 has three distinct integer solutions.
- The equation g(x) = 0 has two distinct integer solutions.
- The greatest common divisor of p and q is 3 (that is, gcd(p,q) = 3).

The word "prove" takes this question to a whole new level!


Spring is the time of year when most of the math competitions occur, and we plan to participate in as many as possible. Worthy of mention is the Euclid competition that will be written on April 7th. This is an important one for students interested in attending the University of Waterloo. Please keep that in mind!



We also typically look forward to our school's team mathematics competition, affectionately called the Totem Torus, which traditionally takes place in mid to late April and is a big competition for us. Students from schools around and even out of the Division come to Shep to compete for glory. The competition consists of an individual exam, a team exam and the ever-popular relay contest. With that being said, it probably comes as no surprise that the status of this year's event is a bit uncertain. Updates will be provided as soon as information becomes available.

For now, we will leave you with one more question from a recent contest. Most people like geometry, so here we go!

Along each edge of the hexagon, a semi-circle with diameter 6 is drawn. Determine the total area of the shaded regions; that is, determine the total area of the regions that lie inside exactly two of the semi-circles.



SOCIAL STUDIES

Quarter 2 has been quite the ride with transitioning between in-person learning to online learning and back again, but with staff and students working together, our Social classes have been able to smoothly adapt. We have been fortunate to witness many of our curricular outcomes come alive in current events from around the world and right here in Alberta. With the American election, environmental issues and the continued impact of COVID-19, students have been able to see the implications of what we are learning in class on a day-to-day basis.

SCIENCE

Feature Spotlight: Mrs. Maria David

A Science department's laboratory technician is the glue that holds the department together. Ross Sheppard is lucky to have Mrs. Maria David as a part of our team.

Her roles are numerous: preparing and organizing materials for labs, supporting teachers and the curriculum by preparing engaging activities for students, and ensuring that safety protocols are in place and up to date. At Ross Sheppard, we have four devoted lab rooms to each of the subject disciplines - General Science, Biology, Physics and Chemistry - that are being used on a daily basis. Our labs house much of the glassware, microscopes, sterilizers, incubators and materials that support Science as a skill-based program.

Mrs. Maria David has been a lab technician at Ross Sheppard since 2015. She was born in Columbia where she obtained a Bachelor's degree in Chemistry. She then moved to the U.S.A., receiving a Master's in Science and pursued a Doctorate in Science upon moving to Canada in 2004. Before her career started with Edmonton Public Schools, Mrs. David's career involved research in organic chemistry. Mrs. David loves coming to work every day and the energy of working in a school with curious students. In her time outside of school, she enjoys camping, hiking and listening to audiobooks. 
INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

Since December 2nd, the majority of the school has been home learning online. This is not the case for our students. Students and staff in the CLS program have been attending school daily. Having the school to ourselves has been an interesting experience. We have been visiting the many great classrooms, science labs and photography labs, as well as accessing gym spaces and the fitness center on a daily basis. This certainly has been a bright spot and an unique learning experience for the students.

In academics, we are progressing with our novel study on 20,000 Leagues under the Sea, as well as classes in functional Math skills. Computer time on Chromebooks and the Raz-Kids reading program remain a popular option and we are seeing great progress in reading skills. In Art classes we have continued to create many interesting projects. Notably, the students each painted a bird house which went home prior to the holidays.

Inside the classroom, we have been studying a unit on Australia and created a very fun Australian Aboriginal art project. Students were really able to work on their creative side and produced some beautiful pieces of work.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This past quarter was a time of change in the Phys Ed department. We were called to go online during the month of December, but with some creativity and innovation were able to deliver Phys Ed in an online format. There were many skills learned such as CPR, juggling, soccer juggling, handstands, headstands and bridges. In addition, students participated in obstacle course races, tracked walking kilometers, worked out and contributed 7500 squats to the Lift the City Squat Challenge which helped raise money for the CASA Foundation. Students also dove into issues around drug doping in athletes, nutrition, sports injuries and ethics in sports. After coming back to in-person instruction, we successfully resumed classes as they were before going online.





SPORTS MEDICINE

This quarter was a busy one for Sports Medicine students. We were all grateful to be able to return to in-person learning in January so that we could work on practical skills for various courses.

Sports Medicine 15 students learned how to tape and practiced many new taping techniques, while Sports Medicine 25 students perfected their taping skills and became certified in Standard First Aid and CPR-C.

Due to the lack of Athletics this quarter, the Sports Medicine 35 class had to get creative for their practicum opportunities. They were each given an injury and sport, and pretend to be that injured athlete while one of their classmates demonstrated a "real" injury assessment to try and determine what the injury was.












FIRST NATIONS, MÉTIS AND INUIT HUB

Métis Week Activities!

Tansi! During Quarter 2, Shep students recognized the important role Métis people have in Canada and the role they played in developing Edmonton. Students were invited to commemorate Métis Week with a number of activities beginning with a school-wide food drive. With the generosity of the Shep family, we were able to overfill two large boxes providing toiletries and food staples to the Métis Child and Family Services Society supported through the local Food Bank. Other activities included I'm proud to be Métis Instagram posts, a virtual presentation by Rupertsland Institute and beading.



A special highlight of Metis Week events included fire building and bannock making sessions. A special T-Bird shout out to Mr. Brendan Smith, and Leadership students Josh Wright and Jacob Locke, for their support in these sessions.

Also during the quarter, the First Nations, Métis and Inuit Hub hosted a series of virtual university presentations for Indigenous youth. Students from all grades were encouraged to join and ask questions. There were presentations from Concordia University, Nîsôhkamâtotân Centre (NAIT) and the University of Alberta with Indigenous Recruiter Aaron Lepine.







Ways of Knowing Course at Shep!

Ways of Knowing is a course designed by students, for students. It focuses on spreading Indigenous teachings, through speakers like Elder Lewis Cardinal of the Sacred Earth Project, and Indigenous educators within EPSB. At the next summit, we question "What does it mean to live in good relation on Treaty 6 territory?" and "What does land mean to you?". To explore these ideas, students will share their stories, and learn from other students around the district through the use of breakout rooms.

"My experience with Ways of Knowing has been the most important experience of my life, thus far! The things I learn and see within this course are unlike anything a student can learn in school. Not only have I learned about Indigenous success, teachings and ways of life, but I've learned how to connect with the land and with myself. The question I ask myself quite often throughout this course is: "How can I integrate these teachings into my own life?" For example, when we first explored the medicine wheel, and looked at the law of 4s, I spent a bit of time reflecting on what land, water, sun and air meant to me and my life. How can I acknowledge these things I use everyday? Last year, when we were able to gather as a group, we smudged together. This experience was something I'll never forget because we were all reflecting on our day together, while learning about smudging. The greatest thing I've gained from this course is learning while experiencing. Overall, Ways of Knowing has opened up a safe space for me to learn and grow as a youth, living in Canada, on a land that has so much unspoken history. I am learning that being vulnerable can work wonders for students, and in my experience, vulnerability has opened so many doors for me, inside and outside of this course. Thank you for the opportunity to speak on my experience on the Ways of Knowing program." - Becca Evans, Grade 12





"Everything looks (and smells) great! She seemed very well organized. She's making us wait for dinner to try it. I think Foods class should continue all year."












Advanced Acting and Technical Theatre

Up to this point in the year, we have had 75 students enrolled in our Work Experience program, which allows students to earn high school credits while working or volunteering in the community. Currently, Ross Sheppard has 8 students enrolled in the Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP), working full or part-time collecting hours towards their trade tickets. This quarter, we had students working in plumbing, cooking, electrical, carpentry and automotive trades. STUDENT SERVICES

Counsellors have been busy helping Grade 12 students with post-secondary applications. The deadline for the University of Alberta is March $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$. Please keep in mind, students are offered a first choice and second choice in terms of programs. If they get an offer for their second choice, they can accept that offer and still be considered for their first choice until July. If you have been offered admission, you have until May $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ to indicate your acceptance. Students may still be



accepted after May $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ on a rolling admission, even throughout the summer, depending on the program.



The rules differ at MacEwan University. There are various deadlines at MacEwan depending on the program. If a student is offered their second choice and accepts it, their first choice will then be discarded. If the student still wants their first choice, they can be placed on a waiting list but their second choice is discarded. It can occasionally be a risk if the student isn't accepted for their first choice by August 1st.

Many of our students have chosen to start their post-secondary journey outside of Alberta at institutions such as the University of Western Ontario, University of Toronto, McGill University, University of British Columbia and University of Victoria.
