INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE



FIRST NATIONS, MÉTIS, AND INUIT HUB

After the discovery of 215 lost children at the Kamloops Residential School by the Tk'emlups te Secwepemc First Nations, our school took a collective moment of silence to remember the children and their families. On June 8th, students and staff wore orange shirts and orange pins, and participated in painting rocks and placing them at the front of our school to show solidarity and honour all of the communities and families affected by this tragedy.

May 5th is the National Day of Awareness of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls. Due to COVID restrictions and the move to online learning in April, our in-school installation was not able to be presented. With the diligent and dedicated efforts of students in the Ways of Knowing program (Becca Evans, Katie Adams, Georgia Phillips and May Kramer), the exhibit was



transformed into a virtual platform and presented to classes in June to raise awareness and knowledge of this ongoing crisis and encourage our community to take action.

MORE ABOUT NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY 2021

The First Nations, Métis and Inuit Hub has been a flurry of activity this month. June is National Indigenous Peoples History Month - a time to reflect upon the history, heritage, diverse cultures and the outstanding achievements of First Nations, Métis and Inuit People. As part of our celebration, students had the opportunity to participate in a Virtual Powwow, learning about Indigenous culture in an authentic and interactive way. We are thankful to Debbie Semeniuk, her family, all those who participated in the creation of the presentation, and Westglen School. As part of Shep TV, O'Canada was sung in Cree by Sheila Williams from our First Nations, Métis and Inuit unit. Celebrations and learning continued with a variety of video opportunities.

June 21st is National Indigenous Peoples Day. This is a day for all Canadians to recognize and celebrate First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples. The Canadian Constitution recognizes these three groups as Aboriginal peoples, also known as Indigenous peoples. Although these groups share many similarities, they each have their own distinct heritage, language, cultural practices and spiritual beliefs. In cooperation with Indigenous organizations, the Government of Canada chose June 21st, the summer solstice, for National Aboriginal Day, now known as National Indigenous Peoples Day. For generations, many Indigenous peoples and communities have celebrated their culture and heritage on or near this day, due to the significance of the summer solstice, the longest day of the year.

Students and staff had the opportunity to participate in a day of celebration, raising a tipi and listening to tipi teachings by Elder Phillip Campiou in the courtyard. A T-Bird thank you to Mr. Lee, who brought this learning opportunity to our school community by providing video expertise, and to Elder Campiou for honouring us with his knowledge and lessons. At lunch time, students and staff enjoyed hot bannock thanks to the hard work of Foods teachers Maureen Dumka-Stephenson, Terri Trout and Donna Woodhouse, and their Foods classes. We enjoyed Chubby Cree's Noah Green, Carol Powder and family, rock out on the big drum singing "Rock Your World", the Honour Song and more. Their music was good medicine, bringing joy and dance to the feet at the front lawn of Shep. In the afternoon, students were treated to the streaming of Rocko and Nakota: Tales from the Land by Annisinabe playwright Josh Longeudoc, with opportunities to engage in talk back after the show.



STUDENTS' UNION & LEADERSHIP
