

SOCIAL STUDIES



At the end of February, our Model United Nations club attended the University of Alberta Model United Nations conference, with over 400 students from 28 schools across the province. The group represented Shep very well, showcasing their diplomatic speech and debate skills over the three-day conference. Shep students excelled, helping to draft resolutions in their committees. All represented the school with enthusiasm and professionalism. Our 67 delegates debated on current global issues ranging from child soldiers, to maritime piracy, to the conflict in Sudan. The students' hard work paid off - they were responsible for sponsoring five resolution papers and won five awards. Congratulations to Aidan Hopwood, Yemaya Azania-Merchant, Delha Mare Mohammad, Lucas Wan and Malcolm Henderson who won awards for best papers and best delegates. Our club had an amazing weekend and all of our delegates should be really proud of their efforts. Special thanks to teachers Amanda Filan, Lindsay Berreth and Griffin Posynick who supported these students throughout the year and during the conference.





On May 13, Social 20 classes had the opportunity to attend the Holocaust Survivors Symposium hosted by the Azrieli Foundation. This symposium served as an educational tool for exploring the history of the Holocaust through the first-hand experience of Marie (Mariette) Doduck, 88, a street survivor of the Holocaust. Now known by Marie, Doduck spoke about her experience through moderated audience questions while telling her story of survival, detailed in her book that every student received, titled "A Childhood Unspoken". The reviews from students and teachers about this experience have been phenomenal and many students were fortunate enough to talk to her and get their books signed as well.





The Psychology 30 class has had a series of guest speakers to support their learning this semester. It was wonderful to have Shep alumni, PhD Kyle Mathewson, speak to the class. Kyle is the head researcher of a lab at the U of A.



SCIENCE

Spending time studying nature is a great way to spend a beautiful May day! All students in Biology 20 set out into Edmonton's own Mill Creek Ravine to complete an ecological field study of the area at the end of May. The Mill Creek Ravine formed approximately ten-thousand years ago at the end of the Ice Age. The ravine has been home to a diverse group of organisms throughout its history, including beavers, white spruce trees and wild berry bushes. The land was lived upon by Indigenous peoples and was at one time designated as the Papaschase Cree Reserve, until settlers arrived in the 1880s seeking the resources that lay in the ravine. The Indigenous peoples from this area were subsequently moved off the land and relocated to the Enoch Cree Nation Reserve. The Mill Creek Ravine soon became a site of industry and pollution until the late 1900s when community members fought for the health and safety of the natural land in Edmonton. In 1973, the Mill Creek "Build a Park" Project began, advocating for the area to no longer be used for industry or urban interests, and instead become a natural park. The Mill Creek Ravine story is an example of the interconnected histories of people and land, and the complexities of historical land use.

Along with the stories told while participating, Biology 20 students spent much of the day evaluating the creek to determine the present day health of the ravine. They made quadrants on north and south facing slopes where they identified plants, looked for signs of animals and observed the abiotic components of the environment. The students then headed down to the shore of the creek to evaluate the quality of the water by completing various water tests.

A highlight of the trip was when students collected water and detritus samples from the bottom of the creek, searching through their samples to isolate the organisms found. Once they got a good look at an organism, they used a classification chart to identify it.

At the end of the day, students used their findings to determine the health of the Mill Creek Ravine ecosystem, and gained an appreciation of nature, science and stories of the land. A hands-on field study is one of the best ways to study ecology and ecosystems, allowing students to see classroom topics in real life scenarios.

FASHION STUDIES

This semester in the Fashion lab we had a Fashion 10 class and a Fashion 20/30 split.

Fashion 10

In Fashion 10, students made great headway on a variety of projects and are finishing with a strong set of sewing machine and sewing equipment skills. We began the semester constructing a small drawstring bag and then moved on to pj shorts. To complete the credit in "Accessories", students made a variety of small projects including a fabric tray, a mug rug, a scrunchie, a keyring to hold lip balm and a small zippered bag. Boxes of fabric curated by Blenderz Garment Recyclers were used in all these projects.

Fashion 20/30

Fashion 20/30 students started the semester with a common accessory project - a quarter scale dress form. We moved on to flat pattern making, utilizing the dress forms with quarter scale basic pattern blocks.

Following these two projects, each class worked on separate credits and sewing projects. The Fashion 20s worked on an "Activewear" hoodie and a personal choice project, finishing with satin-backed crepe pj pants as a component of "Specialty Fabrics 1".

Fashion 30s completed a choice project and then worked on "Couture and Specialty Fabrics" making a complicated sling bag using vinyl, outdoor canvas and leather. Rivets and many finishing details were involved.
